What is Inclusion Scotland?



Is a national disabled person's
 organisation made up of a membership of
 disabled people and their organisations.

 It networks with other allies and public bodies who protect the rights of disabled people.



How is it run?

Disabled people are in charge of the majority of the running and governance of the organisation and importantly we have a high proportion of disabled people in leadership and influencing roles.





Definitions of disability?

Our voices Our choices



Medical Model:

People who have an **impairment** such as a learning disability or neurodiversity, long term physical or mental health condition, physical or sensory impairment.



Social Model:

Share the experience of facing the same barriers socially, economically, physically, attitudinally and civically and that they self-identify with these experiences as disabling.





 Communities of place, who share a locality or geographical place






 Communities of interest, who share an identity, or an experience.




Participatory Budgeting



Finding and co-producing solutions



Analysed the data using Participatory Action Research Groups with all stakeholders: disabled people, their organisations and public body decision makers.

Fed back to disabled people and their organisations their co-produced findings at a local Ministerial Visit, and to decision makers meeting of the Highland Community Planning Partnership.



Promoting inclusive participation



Hosted a series of "active listening events" in 3 community partnership areas (Lochaber, Caithness & Inverness) with nearly 100 people taking part.



Formed an **Inclusion Scotland Highland Advisory Group** with a membership of **28 stakeholders**, made up of disabled people, their organisations and public body decision makers.



Conducted a survey of nearly 200 people including disabled people, their organisations and decision makers.



Mapping current levels of disabled peoples participation in Highland.

We have **no disabled people's participation** at a planning or strategic level shaping the delivery of **Highland integrated health and social care services**.



We have **no disabled people participation** at a planning or strategic **Highland Community Planning Partnership** level.




We are awaiting **statistics** whether disabled people, or their organisations were stakeholders or direct beneficiaries in Highland of **Participatory Budgeting** to date.



What is the awareness like among Highland disabled people?


Disabled People – The way local decisions are made is changing. Here are names of some of those changes. Please tick those you have heard about.

Seeking empowerment

Disabled people said they sought empowerment in 5 ways.


- Communication: using a common language, providing accessible information, and active listening.
- Time and place: involve disabled people early enough in decision making cycles to make a difference in accessible venues where relationships could be formed and maintained.
- o Representativeness and collective advocacy: more representative opportunities for disabled people and support to get their voices heard.
- Impact and accountability: let disabled people know what difference their views have made and how they are taken into account. Let disabled people know what the final decision is.
- Flexibility: provide opportunities to participate that are sociable and enjoyable. Provide a variety of participatory options that fit in with disabled people's everyday lives.





Promoting Participation

Disabled people identified two pairs of barriers and solutions to participation in local decision making.



- Challenging stigma and discrimination (self, social & stigma).
- Sharing critical components (values, norms, & networks).
- Building resources (felt, practical & learnt).
- Growing social capital (bonding, bridging & linking).

The idea of an **expert by experience** in social inclusion is a response to the missing link between **disabled people**, **their organisations** and **public bodies**.




A missing link between on the one hand **providers**of all services and on the other hand disabled


Back to Community Empowerment
