"We will review the Community Empowerment Act, to consider how local communities can have more of a say over how local public assets are used – whether that is taking on the ownership or management of land or buildings, delivery of services to members of their community, or more say in how services are delivered, assets are used and resources are allocated"

# PARTICIPATORY BUDGETING

- Lead for the National PB Support Programme
- Partnership working with COSLA, the wider public sector, third sector, communities and various policy leads
- Providing secretariat support to the National PB Strategic Group
- Guided by the principles of the PB Charter



### LOCAL GOVERNANCE REVIEW

- Local Governance Review is focused on devolving more power from across the public sector to more local levels.
- Democracy Matters was launched jointly with COSLA in 2019.
- 4,000 people got involved in a nationwide conversation.
- Clear that they want more control over the future of the places they know best.
- The second phase of Democracy Matters will be launched shortly.

#### Finance:

Ensuring flows of investment and financial institutions work for local people, communities and businesses.



#### Workforce:

Increasing fair work and developing local labour markets that support the wellbeing of communities.



### Spending:

Maximising community benefits through procurement and commissioning, developing good enterprises, fair work and shorter supply chains.

### Land and property:

Maximise the value that local communities receive from land and property assets, including those held by the public sector.






### Inclusive Ownership:


