Key Definitions

- Race:
- A social construct with no biological basis
- Used historically to categorise and hierarchise groups
- Racism:
- Prejudice + power
- Can operate on individual, institutional, and systemic levels
- Prejudice vs. Discrimination vs. Oppression:
- Prejudice: An attitude or preconceived opinion
- O Discrimination: Biased actions rooted in prejudice
- Oppression: Systemic and pervasive discrimination that benefits one group over another

Historical & Systemic Foundations

- Origins of Racial Categories
- Colonialism and "race science"
- Policies like segregation and apartheid

- Education (segregated schooling, funding disparities)
- Healthcare (unequal access, bias in treatment)
- Criminal Justice (sentencing disparities, policing)
