Community Research: What and Why?

• What is Community Research?

Gathering data (quantitative and qualitative) from local sources.

- Why Do It?
- Understand unique local challenges and priorities.
- Inform effective, targeted interventions.

- Education (e.g., discipline, curriculum)
- Housing (e.g., affordability, segregation, discrimination)
- Health (e.g., access to care, mental health support)
- Employment (e.g., hiring practices, wage gaps)
- Policing & Criminal Justice (e.g., disproportionate targeting, sentencing)
